CONSTRUCTION NOTICE

For Saturday afternoon April 13, 2013 through Monday morning April 15, 2013

Attention Dust Control Permit Holders, Contractors and Stationary Sources

The National Weather Service and the weather models used by the Department of Air Quality (DAQ) are showing the potential for high winds starting Saturday and continuing through Monday morning. The forecast is for sustained winds between **15 and 25 mph, with gusts to 30 mph.**

It is important each permittee inspect their site and employ Best Available Control Measures to stabilize all disturbed soils. Permittees with multiple sites should contact each site superintendent or Dust Monitor to ensure compliance with the Air Quality Regulations.

Blasting: This forecast is for wind gusts of 25 mph and greater, construction projects that conduct blasting should not load blasting materials and/or perform any blasting operations if wind gusts approach the 25 mph limit. They should monitor wind speeds locally and not blast if winds approach the limit.

This is NOT a Dust Advisory. DAQ will continue to monitor these forecasts for any further wind development. If the weather forecast is upgraded and conditions warrant, you will be notified of a Dust Advisory.

Air Quality Advisory Issued For Dust Today Through This Evening

Due to extremely high winds across the western Mojave Desert, last night, suspended dust has worked its way into Clark County this morning. That combined with expected high winds, Clark County Department of Air Quality (DAQ) officials are advising residents and operators of local construction sites of the possibility of blowing dust today through this evening.

At this time, unhealthy levels of dust are not occurring. As part of the county's dust-control program, air quality officials are sending notices to construction sites in the Las Vegas Valley and other outlying areas in the County, asking them to take precautions to prevent blowing dust. Air Quality officials will continue to monitor conditions and will post an alert on the forecast page of the DAQ website if unhealthy levels actually occur. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

Under windy conditions, localized or valley-wide areas of blowing dust are likely to occur. Airborne dust is a form of inhalable air pollution called particulate matter, or PM, which aggravates respiratory diseases such as bronchitis and asthma. It may be best for children, the elderly, and people with respiratory diseases to stay indoors during dust storms. If you are experiencing breathing difficulties or medical conditions that you think are related to air quality, see your doctor. Detailed air quality conditions are posted in the monitoring section of the DAQ website. Air Quality officials will continue to monitor conditions and will post an update on the forecast page of the DAQ website if unhealthy levels cease.
