**I. Call to Order**

Fernandez Leary, LEPC Chairman called the meeting to order at 9:11 A.M. on Tuesday November 13, 2012.

**II. Roll Call**

Fernandez Leary: Quorum present.

**III. Public Comments**

**IV. Comments from the Chair**

The Chair introduced himself providing some background on his position as an administrative Deputy Fire Chief with the Clark County Fire Department. The Chair further advised the committee of the recent administrative change and physical relocation of the Clark County Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (OEMHS), he stated that with those changes he was also appointed as the new LEPC Chair and the designated County Emergency Manager as well as the Chair of the Urban Area Working Group. He advised that while Irene Navis is no longer serving as the LEPC Chair, she will remain on staff as the Plans and Operations Coordinator for Clark County OEMHS. The Chair announced that business will remain as usual he didn't foresee any major changes in staffing of OEMHS. The Chair advised the committee that he has an "open door" policy and that if anyone needs to get in touch with him to please feel free to do so.

The Chair then publicly recognized Irene Navis' efforts as the former LEPC Chair and County Emergency Manager, thanking her for her for all that she has contributed and that he is pleased she will remain on his team.

**V. Approval of August 15, 2012 Regular Meeting Minutes**

Motion, by Ryan Turner: To accept the minutes as recorded.

Seconded, by Nicole Hart.

No discussion, motioned carried.

**VI. Approve and Recommend the updated 2012 Hazardous Materials Emergency Response Plan for submission to the State Emergency Response Commission**

Irene Navis, Plans and Operations Coordinator Clark County Office of Emergency Management, first thanked Richard Brenner for his assistance in gathering and compiling the information for the updates. Irene advised that she and Richard had worked together on the finishing touches of this plan and it is ready for any additional comments based upon the review of the LEPC. Irene further advised that she had received comments from Jane Shunney that she would read into the record after first asking the LEPC if there are any other comments, corrections or changes. Irene asked the group if there was anything they would like to add, seeing no response she moved forward to read the following from Jane Shunney: Irene said that Jane asked for in terms of the contact phone numbers adding a phone to the Health Districts section, a phone number for the office of preparedness 702-759-1671. In section A5 *coordinating the Clark County Mass Casualty Incident Plan when activated by an incident commander when large numbers of injured, sick or exposed persons may be expected* the Southern Nevada Health District does not do this and she asked for that portion to be deleted. One last change in terms of environmental health they asked for the air sampling responsibility to be removed from the plan because they don't do that. Irene then stated that other than those changes did anyone have anything else that needs to be done with the plan. Seeing none she turned it over to the Chair recommending approval asking him to call for a motion to include the changes made by the Health District.

The Chair called for a motion.

Motion, by Dan Lake: To Approve the plan with the changes .

Seconded, by Ryan Turner.

No discussion, motioned carried.

**VII. Review and Approve the updated 2012 LEPC Bylaws**

Irene Navis advised that everyone should have received the draft update to the bylaws. She further advised the group that this is again just an annual requirement by the SERC that needed to be done. Irene the stated that nothing significantly had changed. She then advised that there were simply a few clean up items that were noticed such as the first paragraph SARA Title Roman numeral three. In the second bullet, clarification of that statement. Third bullet just a change to the LEPC for formatting, again further down third from the bottom bullet SARA Title Roman numeral three. On page two under representation there was an update to the public law number so that was included. The SERC also asked that we mirror more closely to what they have for member representation in categories so that change was made as well. At the bottom just to comply with what we do as LEPC in Clark County about the Board of County Commissioners etc. Then the very last section Article VII just a change in terminology.

The Chair called for a motion.

Scott Emerson, American Red Cross, then spoke up about placing media into a required category as it is an actual law and a required organization not just at the pleasure of the County Commissioners.

Irene Navis stated that she would double check with the SERC and if in fact it was an actual law she would make that necessary change as well.

Then Chair then called again for a motion with the change as mentioned by Scott Emerson.

Motion, by Richard Brenner: **To Approve the bylaws as submitted to include the recommended changes.**

Seconded, by Scott Emerson.

Discussion was had and lead by Richard Brenner. Richard mentioned Article one, item number six where it says “establish and maintain a system for managing the submission of industry reports” he stated that he didn’t think we did that anymore as the system is now electronic and maintained by the State so Richard advised that he thought it should be struck from the bylaws. Irene then addressed Richard by saying she thought that was what it was referring to, the State system that is used. Irene then asked if it would be better to say “provide input into the State maintained system” Richard agreed that would be ok. Irene noted that change. The Chair then and asked for any other discussion and seeing none called for the vote.

Motioned carried.

**VIII. Discuss and Approve LEPC endorsement to move forward with the Spot On Response Element for the UICDS Pilot**

Richard Wells, City of Las Vegas, narrated verbatim through a brief report on the project (*see attached power point*)

Dan Lake stated that he would have preferred to have had a demo before this request as it is an extremely visual product. Richard advised that he would be happy to do so at a future meeting if that was the desire of the group.

Dan then asked if there was going to be a motion and the Chair advised and Richard Wells concurred that this was an informational only item, Richard advised that it could come back before the LEPC at another time as an action item.

**IX. EOC Standardization**

Dan Lake, City of North Las Vegas Emergency Management, provided a brief overview of the project and advised that it has now been completed and will move into the training phase soon. Dan advised that he received word this morning that all product will be delivered this afternoon so organizations can begin to picking up their materials.

There will be a secondary piece that will go with this, a training product that is to mirror the materials. Dan advised that just after the first of the year they will begin delivery of this course organization by organization to train the product so that there is no misunderstanding or miscommunication as to what the intent of the product is, should be, and how it is to be utilized in each Emergency Operations Center (EOC.) Dan further stated that within the next six months the northern part of the State will be taking this product and begin implementation.

The Chair commented and what an excellent project this was in the sense that it will really allow for all of the jurisdictions to work together interchangeably in the event that someone needs to step in and help another agency.

**X. Great Shakeout Report**

Scott Emerson, CEO American Red Cross Southern Nevada Chapter, reported on behalf of Jeff Brewer that the 2013 Great Nevada Shakeout occurred at 10:18 a.m. on October 18th, 2012. 359,628 enrolled in this year's exercise compared to 46,071 last year.

**XI. E-learning Modules update**

Ric LaPorte, Clark County Emergency Management and Homeland Security Training and Exercise Coordinator, reported on the e-learning project relative to the CNIP Tools/Mission Ready Packs/Preparedness Plan Preparation. He distributed CD's to the committee and demonstrated the first three slides of the module, asking that if anyone has difficulties with the format on the CD to contact him and he would provide it in another format as there are multiple ways to deliver the information.

Open conversation ensued between Dan Lake and Ric LaPorte about the support of the updates on the CNIP tool. Ric advised that he would look into the means for the update. The Chair advised the CCOEMHS would look into the update and get back to the committee by or before the next LEPC meeting.

**XII. A. LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE**

**a. Plans Administration Subcommittee**

Richard Brenner advised that the earlier agenda item for the HazMat plan was the most recent project that the subcommittee had worked on and that in the coming 2013 calendar year there would likely be two exercises wherein the plan would be exercised. In 2012 the plan was exercised at UNLV and it didn't go as well as expected so that too will be worked on. Richard reported that he had been working with Dan Lake in North Las Vegas and UNLVDPD to get the communications issues addressed. Now that has been addressed there will be a communications drill as well as another HazMat exercise. The next LEPC meeting Richard advised that he will have an exercise that he will need to get approval on.

**e. Legislative Subcommittee**

Arlene Chapman, Clark County Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security Logistics Coordinator, provided an overview report of BDR's that were going before the Legislature in the 77<sup>th</sup> session. Arlene advised that in one way or another each of the BDR's she would review touched upon Emergency Services. At that time Arlene narrated her report (*see attached*)

**f. Community Awareness & Emergency Response**

Richard Brenner spoke on behalf of Susan Crowley. There was a recent meeting that the three plants attended as well as Henderson. Radio communications was a topic of discussion, transferring to a digital system from analog. The important piece to that conversation is that Henderson as well as Clark County and City of Las Vegas HAZMat need to make sure they have interoperability with each other. Another topic covered was Henderson's dispatch center board that the plants can communicate with them using a color code system green/yellow/red. This was put into service in the 90's and there is talk to update the old system to something newer. Another

notable topic at the meeting was about a 10 inch pipeline that pipes chlorine from Olin over to TIMET. The line was built back in the 1940's, they are in the process of trying to put a new system in to replace the old line so they can demolish some of the older buildings.

Areliya Denby, Samaritan Global (member of the public), asked a question about what type of outreach is being done for the high risk populations as far as training referring to the elderly, disabled and lower income.

Richard Brenner addressed her question from the HazMat standpoint citing the actions that would be taken according to the plan.

Dan Lake advised Ms. Denby about the North Las Vegas website and the information available there as well as encouraged her to check with the CERT program for more training.

Elaine Houser, Clark County Water Reclamation, also addressed Ms. Denby's concerns about the homeless populations and information sharing.

**g. Community Organizations Active in Disaster**

Scott Emerson advised that Robin Kelley was no longer the representative and that elections of new officers was forthcoming at the next meeting. Furthermore, Scott stated the Salvation Army has discontinued their Disaster Director paid position and that will have some implications on the delivery of service in the area. This is also the time for agencies to renew their affiliate membership to COAD.

**h. Emergency Management Coordinators Group**

Dan Lake reported that the last meeting held was the first week of November, EMC meetings are held quarterly and rotate amongst the members. Dan reported that at the last meeting Aaron Keneston, Washoe County Emergency Management, along with his group took over the meeting and discussed Continuity of Operations Planning (COOP.) The initiative for this planning project began in the northern part of the State with two pilot programs in the south, one being in Henderson the other with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. Dan described the project and the intent which is to assist in helping others write their continuity of operations plans. Dan turned over the report to Ryan Turner and Nicole Hart to describe their involvement.

Nicole Hart, Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, reported that at Metro they currently have 52 COOP plans that they are in the process of developing, she advised that from an agency standpoint they have really taken ownership throughout the bureaus and the sections. LVMPD chose to take a much different approach than other levels government within the community. That decision was made because each of the mission functions are so different and unique from section to section they wanted to be sure that they truly identified what they needed to continue through their eyes versus those of executive staff. Nicole advised that about 505 of their plans are between 50 and 75% complete, while there are a few that are right at the 90% range for completion. The agency end date goal is the end of February 2013.

Ryan Turner, City of Henderson, reported that in Henderson they broke out into the different departments such as Police, Fire and Building all very large departments. Ryan justified the reasoning behind this method in breaking down the process by stating that in their strategic plan they are moving forward in the Emergency Management Accreditation Program (EMAP.) Ryan then explained the standards of

accreditation and then further explained what it meant to have a COOP in place. He provided the website [www.nvcontinuity.com](http://www.nvcontinuity.com) for more information about the program.

Dan Lake then advised the group that Aaron Kenneston has expressed his willingness to continue forward and to assist with future planning efforts even to help with finding additional funds. Anyone interested should contact Nicole Hart, Ryan Turner or Aaron Kenneston via the website.

The Chair commented on the program and complimented the contractor for being able to share real world incident issues from back east, relative COOP plans and the deficits that they have in that area. He further stated that the County will be working towards this as well as accreditation and that will be discussed at a later time in the Urban Area Working Group.

Dan Lake announced a training opportunity for ICS/EOC Interface G191 course in January. This course style will be used for the EOC Standardization Project. Anyone interested in the G191 class should contact Dan or Clark County OEMHS for more information.

Ryan Turner spoke again to clarify that this was a statewide initiative and that LVMPD and the City of Henderson were the pilots projects for Southern Nevada but that all others are encouraged to participate.

**k. Nuclear Waste Division Yucca Mountain Update**

Phil Klevatorick, Clark County Nuclear Waste Division, reported that there have been some significant changes. There are a couple of environmental impact statements coming out in the next month although they were due just prior to the election. One of the reports is the Site Wide EIS for the Nevada National Security Site (NNSS), this report will come up with at least one preferred alternative, although he has no knowledge of what that is as it was never discussed in the original draft that was done a year ago. Phil advised that he expects to submit a lot comment on this final draft and encouraged others to get involved, he stated that he would be happy to coordinate the comments or they could be submitted directly. He stated that the group that put this together last year said that they heard us loud and clear about the "spaghetti bowl" and not using it when transporting low level waste to the NNSS. However, Phil stated, that he wanted to bring awareness to the I-11 corridor, and the partnership between Nevada and Arizona. Phil advised that if that materializes you can forget any kind of agreement between the Governor that said the spaghetti bowl wasn't going to happen. If this agreement does happen you can expect that shipments will go through unabated and unrestricted from the usage standpoint because of the Commercial Interstate Commerce Act.

Phil further advised that the Department of Energy (DOE) and Environmental Management are going to start reconvening the Transportation Working Group that was going last year during the Site Wide EIS. This group was also convened ten years ago for the previous Site Wide EIS. Phil encouraged the group to participate in this because the more they hear from other agencies on potential impacts the better.

Phil advised the group of the impending court decisions as a result of the Aiken County, Washington State, Nye County and others that filed for the writ of mandamus for the harm that has been caused for not constructing and pursuing the license and application for Yucca Mountain. Phil stated that he expects sometime middle part of December 2012 the decision will be announced.

**I. State Emergency Response Commission**

Richard Brenner reported that they held the last meeting in Las Vegas. Local LEPC member Wendy Pagan from UMC attended. They also recently held the Fire Shows Reno Conference in Reno October 22-24. There 122 people that received grants to attend the conference. SERC worked with the Nevada Fire Chiefs to host this conference and there was good attendance from Northern California and the Northwest in general. This is third year in putting on this conference and they look forward to doing it again next year.

**m. Satellite Phone Update**

Dan Lake advised that they continue to share information about this group and he encouraged anyone to provide updates that they may have about their satellite systems and contact numbers.

Dan advised that they will likely start their 2013 meetings in March due to the fact there is a large Communications Rodeo scheduled for February 6, 2013 at the Las Vegas Motor Speedway. Dan advised who he had been working with at Metro and that this year the exercise was going to be a lot different than in years past.

Dan advised the committee that there are no new initiatives on the table right now but that it is always open for those in need of communications/satellite phones because they do have small size grants that occasionally pop up over the course of a year that they help assist people in tapping into. He asked people to remember it is equipment that they can assist with not service associated fees.

**B. CITIZEN CORPS COUNCIL REPORTS**

- **Amateur Radio Emergency Service**

- **Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)**  
Dan Lake reported on behalf of Rick Diebold. Dan advised that there are an extensive number of courses being offered, this course is not just for citizens in the community but also for your employees who are citizens. He encouraged everyone to reach out and take the opportunity to participate and stated that CERT is a good program and good for your organization.
- **Medical Reserve Corps**

- **Neighborhood Watch**  
Nicole Hart, LVMPD, reported that they are up 40 programs now at 1,475. One of the big events that was held was in Bolden Area Command, the annual Trunk or Treat event they hundreds in attendance.

Dan Lake reported that their Neighborhood Watch conducted their annual safe Halloween at Home Depot there were close to 3,000 participants. People lined up at about 5:00 PM and ended around 9:30.

Ryan Turner reported that the Henderson Neighborhood Watch program did their annual Trunk or Treat and it too was very successful.

- **Volunteer in Police Service**

Nicole Hart advised that Metro currently has 458 volunteers. The October stats were not made available in time for this meeting however, without October last quarter they had 26,137 hours of volunteer service which is pretty incredible considering there is an entire month missing from the stats. The majority of those hours went towards National Night Out back in August.

#### **VII. Public Comments**

- Arelia Denby spoke and advised that Dan Lake had answered her question about ex-offenders taking the CERT class and any pre-requisites that there may be for taking a CERT class. Dan again clarified that there are no pre-requisites aside from being a member of the community.
- Ric LaPorte reminded the LEPC of the HSEEP Training in January and that there was still room for anyone interested.
- Elaine Houser, Clark County Water Reclamation, advised that according to her understanding of the new bylaws she was no longer a member of the LEPC, she expressed that the utilities and special districts needed to be represented. Irene Navis addressed Elaine's comments about the bylaws and clarified the intent of the language, she also reaffirmed that the Water Reclamation District was still a representative member of the LEPC. Elaine asked for it to be clarified so that people understand because there is value in their involvement. Irene stated that anyone who was previously named in terms of a Board Resolution group that is eligible to be a LEPC member remains, that hasn't changed because of the bylaws.

# Las Vegas UICDS Pilot Core Status

12/05/2012

# Background

In September 2011 members of the LEPC were invited to an informational seminar on UICDS which stands for Unified Incident Command Decision Support. At that meeting we learned that UICDS is a DHS Science and Technology Directorate initiative for information sharing with a goal to enable information sharing and decision support among many agencies and systems. Technically UICDS provides a standardized framework for exposing select relevant data from commercial and government applications.

What that means is that UICDS serves as middleware transporting key data from emergency applications like a dispatch system and making it consumable in an existing interface like a WebEOC board or on a map. The system works based on Data Sharing Agreements among partners dictating what data will be shared and with whom. To date we have worked out a few proof of concepts and are in the early stages of standing up the city of Las Vegas UICDS core.

Thanks to the support of the Las Vegas, Clark County and North Las Vegas Fire Departments, the core's first local data source will be pulling select data from the Fire Alarm Office Dispatch system and populating it into the city's WebEOC. This data will join other national and local sensor data including earthquake locations, airport weather sensors, air quality sensors, and air quality alerts we are currently pulling in. Ultimately we look to increase the number of data feeds from many of the organizations represented here today at the LEPC.

# New Tools and Opportunities

So instead of having to use multiple applications and websites, UICDS brings all that information together in one place to begin to make better sense of. With UICDS you are able to see what is happening in real-time from a variety of sources and whether there is a connection to other incidents and locations showing up. With the city of Las Vegas core one of the initial priorities has been to make WebEOC a more valuable tool for everyday use, and therefore more familiar to everyone during an emergency.

Today we have an offer from - Spot On Response - to use their mobile app for the community as a way to stay connected and to communicate during an emergency. The mobile app has the ability to see all the information in UICDS based on a users own personal area of interest. If someone just wants to see events and information that fall within the resort corridor they will be able to do so. The geography you define will determine the information displayed.

The mobile app will provides the ability to make field observations about any incident. If you are responding to an incident, you can make notes, add photos or video to allow others to better understand what is going on. The result is a two-way flow of information allowing users to better stay in touch and make collaborative decisions. We responded to the Community Resiliency Grant in hopes of improving our ability to tie together the UCIDS pilot and the Spot On mobile application. At a future meeting we would like to come back and demo where we are with all this.

A key takeaway is that UICDS is only as good the information being shared. It will only be successful if we are able to pull a wide variety of feeds from public safety, critical infrastructure, health departments, the private sector and so on.



## **U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Pacific Southwest Region Emergency Prevention and Preparedness Program Update For the Clark County Local Emergency Planning Committee Meeting in Las Vegas, Nevada on Tuesday, November 13, 2012**

### **Regional Response Team Tabletop Exercise and Meeting**

The federal Regional Response Team 9 (Pacific Southwest), co-chaired by the U.S. EPA and the Coast Guard, hosted a Southern Nevada (Clark County) response and recovery seminar and table top exercise on October 29-31 in Las Vegas. The event, as follow-up to the FEMA-led Simple Truth exercise, involved the “release” of Bacillus anthracis (anthrax) into the environment. The sponsoring agencies were Clark County Emergency Management, the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection, the U.S. Coast Guard and EPA. The seminar portion of the event included presentations from the State of Nevada, Clark County Emergency Management, Nevada State and local health departments, and EPA (representing the federal government). EPA engaged back-up Regions 8 (EPA office in Denver) and 10 (EPA office in Seattle) to support the exercise. The exercise was followed by the Regional Response Team 9 standing meeting in Las Vegas on November 1 and 2.

### **EPA Discontinues LEPC Contacts Database**

As of September 1, 2012, the U.S. EPA discontinued its national database of Local Emergency Planning Committee contacts. It was cumbersome for the EPA to maintain a current, accurate list for all LEPC contacts across the nation.

The EPA only will provide and maintain on its website [www.epa.gov/emergencies](http://www.epa.gov/emergencies) , the list of contacts for the State Emergency Response Commissions. It will be the responsibility for each state to provide and maintain its list of LEPC contacts on a website and/or other means.

### **Revision to List of Federal Reading Rooms for Risk Management Plans**

The EPA was recently informed by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) that there is a revised list of federal reading rooms to provide members of the public with "read-only" access to paper copies of Risk Management Plans (RMPs), including Off-Site Consequences Analysis (OCA) information. The federal RMPs are submitted to the U.S. EPA by chemical facilities. Although all federal reading rooms provide the same information, some reading rooms are operated by the Department of Justice and others are the responsibility of the EPA. The reading room list is available on the EPA website at [www.epa.gov/emergencies/content/rmp/readingroom.htm](http://www.epa.gov/emergencies/content/rmp/readingroom.htm) .

All DOJ reading rooms are operated on an "appointment-only" basis. A person must contact the DOJ's toll-free appointment line, 1-888-442-9267, at least 7 days prior to the expected date to review RMPs. The requester will be asked to provide a full name; a daytime telephone number; the reading room location the person wishes to visit; and the names of the facilities for the RMPs the person wants to view. In addition, the requester must provide a home or work address that identifies which Local Emergency Planning Committee district the person is located to receive access to those RMPs.

A reading room representative will contact the requester by telephone prior to the requested appointment date. The reading room representative will confirm the date and time of the reading room visit and will provide the address of the reading room site.

### **EPA Issues Fact Sheet Regarding Revisions to the OSHA Hazard Communication Standards**

The EPA issued a fact sheet in August 2012 regarding revisions to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's Hazard Communication Standard (OSHA's HCM). In March of this year, OSHA modified its HCS to conform to the United Nations' Globally Harmonized System (GHS) of Classification and Labeling of Chemicals. The revisions will improve consistency and quality of information that is provided to both employers and employees concerning chemical hazards and protective measures related to chemical hazards. GHS is a system developed by the UN to strengthen international efforts concerning the environmentally sound management of chemicals.

GHS includes harmonized provisions for classification of chemicals for their health, physical and environmental effects, as well as for labels on containers and safety data sheets (SDSs, formerly "Material Safety Data Sheets" or MSDSs). Section 311(d) (2) of

the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA) requires an owner or operator to submit a revised MSDS to the SERC, LEPC and local fire department within three months of finding significant new information about the hazardous chemical for which an MSDS was previously submitted. One of the first effective due dates for employers will be December 1, 2013. That is when employees must be trained on the new label elements and the SDS format.

### **LEPC Input Requested for National Preparedness Report 2013**

The EPA, in support of Presidential Policy Directive #8, is submitting preparedness data sources to the Federal Emergency Management Agency for the development of its 2013 National Preparedness Report (NPR). The report is submitted annually to the President and summarizes how prepared we are as a nation. The next NPR is due to the President on March 30, 2013. The 2012 NPR can be found on the FEMA website at: <https://www.fema.gov/library/viewRecord.do?id=5914> .

Key indicators in the NPR are Threat, Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) information. EPA is interested in ensuring that State Emergency Response Commissions and Local Emergency Planning Committees are aware of this effort and have the opportunity to contribute preparedness data sources for inclusion in the report. ### **EPA Awards Over \$126,000 to Nevada for Clean Diesel Project in Clark County**

The EPA last month awarded \$126,421 to the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP) for a clean diesel project in Clark County. It was part of the agency's national campaign with \$30 million being awarded to reduce harmful diesel exhaust that can lead to asthma attacks and premature deaths. NDEP received the grant to replace a Clark County public works street sweeper with a 2010 or newer vehicle. This project is expected to reduce 0.6 tons of particulate matter, 11.5 tons of nitrogen oxides, 1.3 tons of hydrocarbons, 5.6 tons of carbon monoxide, and 1.165 tons of carbon dioxide emissions over its operational lifetime.

### **EPA Awards More Than \$32,000 for Clark County Schools Indoor Air Quality**

The EPA's Indoor Air Quality Tools for Schools program practices include controlling moisture and mold; maintaining quality heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems; integrated pest management; and effective cleaning and maintenance.
