This house was designed by Warner and Nordstrom and features Tudor Chalet and Scandinavian elements. It was built for Jake Hagenson.

In 1935, the house was purchased by one of the owners of the Boulder Club, a gaming establishment on Fremont Street, named Prosper J. Goumond. In addition to the Boulder Club, he purchased Tule Springs in 1941 and built it into a successful dude ranch. Prosper, his wife Gertrude and granddaughter, Margo resided in this home. Domestic help was provided by a maid and cook. A full basement sat under the home in its original location and it also featured one of the first private swimming pools in Las Vegas.

The house was donated by to the museum by the 330 Associates. Moving the house required the removal and separate transportation of the rockwork and carport. Once at the museum, all parts were reinstalled, and renovation took over ten years.
