


Indian Springs Annual Spooktacular

November is Overflowing with Fun in Moapa Valley


Friday evening, November 4th, from 4 pm to 8 pm, the Logandale Volunteer Fire Dept. is sponsoring “The Elegant Driver” in conjunction with the internationally-known Hump n Bump, a permitted rock-crawling event, now in its 35th year and held at Logandale Trails. The Elegant Driver tests a driver’s ability to Tread Lightly. By treading lightly, the driver demonstrates his or hers ability to operate their off-road vehicle responsibly with respect for the environment and nature. Indeed, the elegant driver is a responsible and ethical recreationalist. Participants will elegantly navigate their vehicle slowly through an obstacle course. “The Elegant Driver” is a low speed driving skills challenge where the object is to drive slowly, elegantly, and smoothly over various, mild obstacles without spinning tires, making dust, minimal stopping and backing up, hitting cones. Open to all and free to spectators, this will be an unusual and fun evening!

Veteran’s Day weekend, November 11th through 13th also features multiple activities to enjoy. A local favorite is the Native American Day at Lost City Museum on Saturday, November 12th from 10 am to 4 pm. Admission is \$5 for adults and kids under 18 are free, so this is a wonderful option for a family day of dancing, Music, Food, and Fun—as well as touring the museum.

Or, for an entirely different bit of fun, consider bringing your OHV, ATV, jeep, or RZR to the Veteran’s Parade on November 11th. Join the Moapa Valley Revitalization Project and the Moapa Valley Chamber of Commerce and ride in the parade! Plan to stage at 9 am and check <http://playinourdirt.com/> for specific information closer to the actual event day. The 2nd Annual Moapa Valley OHV Roundup is this weekend and is free to the public. The event is designed to acquaint visitors with the exciting OHV options in the northeast corner of Clark County. Stop by the fairgrounds and check out vendor row; look for Partner In Conservation’s Logandale Trails booth for free maps and local information. As part of the OHV Roundup, on Saturday, November 12th, watch the Hare and Scramble Motorcycle Races that start at 7 am and go through late afternoon. Later that evening, the OHV Roundup is sponsoring dinner and providing a free concert for all to enjoy.

The following weekend is filled with diverse and fun options for enjoying the outdoors in southern Nevada. Calico Racing is hosting a series of marathon races through the Logandale Trails area. Art Exhibit from the Author of The Stumps of Flattop Hill

Award-winning children’s author Kenneth Kit Lamug exhibits illustrations from his new picture book at the Laughlin Library through January 7. The Stumps of Flattop Hill is a macabre tale of a little girl who enters the town’s legendary haunted house in the face of fear. A dark tale for children in the tradition of the Brothers Grimm, it calls to mind the provocative illustration style of Edward Gorey. Scary and entertaining, this book challenges the idea of what children’s books can be.

From the author about The Stumps of Flattop Hill “This book was written in the tradition of classic fairytales, where bad things can and often do happen. A brave little girl faces her fears to find the answer to a curious question – what ghastly creature lie inside the house on Flattop Hill? Does she find something good or bad? This book is meant to be read aloud; that’s when it comes alive. It is my goal to inspire and spark imaginations. Kids love campfire stories and this is one that will keep them talking! “
