# Clark County Criminal Justice Coordinating Council

## MEETING MINUTES August 21, 2025, 3:00 p.m.

#### **Call to Order**

The meeting called to order and a quorum was established.

### **Review and Approve Minutes**

• June 18, 2025, meeting minutes were unanimously approved.

#### Informational

- I. One Safe Place Presentation and Update. (CEO, Liz Ortenburger)
  - Liz Ortizberger introduced herself as CEO of Safe Nest, an agency serving Clark County focused on domestic and sexual violence.
  - Presentation focused on One Safe Place Campus and the opportunity for Metro to potentially relocate the Family Justice Center (FJC) onto the campus.
  - Family Justice Center (FJC) Affiliation
    - The One Safe Place campus is intended to operate as a Family Justice Center model, but the current FJC has not pursued formal affiliation.
    - Affiliation requires a set number of partner agencies on site, which has not yet been met locally.
    - o Further clarification will be provided during the September 9th call.
  - Domestic Violence & Homicide Data
    - o 2025: 53 homicides county-wide, down 36% overall.
    - o 16 domestic homicides so far in 2025, compared to 12 in 2024.
    - o Domestic homicides already surpass the prior year's total.
    - Noted incidents included cases involving multiple family members.
    - Historic note: when the FJC opened in 2018, there was a temporary drop in homicide numbers, but no sustained decrease in following years.
  - Campus Plans & Partners
    - Potential partners: Metro, Department of Child and Family Services, housing providers, advocacy organizations.
    - o Housing opportunities included, with \$1 million in funding.
    - Distinction between Metro advocates (non-confidential) and nonprofit victim advocates (confidential services).
    - Goal is to secure at least five affiliated partners to meet Family Justice Center standards.
  - Questions/Comments
    - o Discussion on why the current FJC does not meet affiliation standards.
    - Clarification that affiliation involves formal protocols and requirements.
    - o Emphasis on the need for on-site partners to strengthen the model and services.

- Next Steps / Follow-Up:
  - Additional clarification on FJC affiliation standards to be provided during the September
    9th call
  - Safe Nest to continue developing partnerships and securing on-site services for affiliation.
- II. Discussion regarding the 2026-2029 Strategic Plan.
  - Looking Ahead
    - As the Council enters the final five months of the year, members were asked to consider:
      - What is next for the CJCC?
      - What do we want to accomplish?
      - What legacy should this board leave?
    - Review of key accomplishments under the *Safety and Justice Challenge* (noting the initiative is coming to a close).
      - Established and expanded programs that divert individuals away from jail at the earliest possible point.
      - Increased collaboration with law enforcement and service providers to route eligible individuals into treatment and community-based services instead of custody (Community Navigators).
      - Strengthened collaboration between justice partners and community providers to improve victim safety and offender accountability.
      - Advanced planning for co-location of Domestic Violence services.
      - Expanded pretrial supervision and monitoring to reduce reliance on money bail and promote fairness (Initial Appearance Court and PCU).
      - Increased data-driven practices for tracking outcomes of pretrial release versus detention.
      - Developed shared data dashboards to measure disparities and guide targeted interventions.
      - Created partnerships with community stakeholders to ensure transparency and accountability.
  - L2K (Legal 2000) and Release Process
    - o Discussion on release timelines and related safety concerns.
    - Noted inconsistencies in release practices and need for further subject matter expertise.
    - o Attorney representation not always being notified of key developments.
    - Suggestion: Continue with the current workgroup that is reviewing and improving L2K process.
  - Resort Corridor Crime Subcommittee
    - Consideration of forming or continuing a workgroup to address corridor-related issues.
  - Data & Measurement
    - Review of updated statistics, with noted increases compared to prior years.
    - o Emphasis on using data to guide decision-making and identify gaps.
  - Toxicology Lab Updates
    - o Previous meetings lacked input from key toxicology stakeholders.
    - Toxicology representatives were invited to present at the subcommittee meetings.
    - Judges are invited to attend for further discussion.
  - Electronic Discovery
    - Ongoing issues with discovery materials being passed between Metro, DA's Office, and defense without clear organization.
    - Concern about duplication of effort and lack of centralized process.

- Discussion on upgrading software or exploring systems used in smaller jurisdictions as possible solutions.
- Action Items / Next Steps:
  - Workgroup formation/continuation for:
    - Resort Corridor Crime.
    - Review of L2K/mental health hold and release process.
  - Explore improvements to electronic discovery processes, including software upgrades and jurisdictional best practices.
