MEETING MINUTES

April 27, 2026, 4:00 p.m.

Call to Order

- Meeting called to order by Co-Chair Judge De La Garza.
- Quorum was established with representation from courts, DA, PD, Probation & Parole, and Commissioners.

Review and Approve Minutes

- Minutes from February 19, 2026, meeting were unanimously approved.

Informational

I. Subcommittee Updates

Community Navigators

- Program focuses on “super users,” high-need behavioral health populations, MAT participants, females, and individuals from M1–M4 sectors.
- Transportation barriers persist, discussion of partnership with Metro for direct transport from jail to CSC.
- Navigators routinely issue bus passes; they need more structured warm handoffs.
- Daily data notifications allow repeated contact with high-utilizer clients.
- Interest in developing a one-stop-shop service center, consolidating assessments, programming, employment, IDs, clothing, and benefits to reduce fragmentation.

Deflection & Diversion

- Miami Model provides comprehensive crisis stabilization, outpatient and residential services, vocational supports, and year-long follow-up.
- Clark County continues to struggle with competency restoration and long state wait times.
- Need for a shared problem statement and long-term goals around diversion and behavioral health outcomes.
- Importance of aligning partners (e.g., LIMA and other centers) and avoiding duplication of services.

Corridor Crime Committee

- Courts close to implementing case-identification flagging and improving reporting.
- State funding will support improved IT infrastructure and dashboards for data sharing.
- Work underway with county leadership to improve in-jail assessments, navigator integration, and early screening for repeat utilizers.
- Jail generating new reports for M1–M4 arrest sectors; navigators receiving these lists daily.
- Metro piloting Crisis Stabilization Center (CSC) diversion at multiple sites, including Convention Center.
- Resorts Sector: No operational changes; continuing to rely on Metro’s CSC diversion pathways.

Pretrial Services

- NPRA (Nevada Pretrial Risk Assessment) revalidation underway; awaiting final dataset from Monitor.
- Agencies refining internal processes and preparing for potential model updates.
- Challenges continue with Electronic Monitoring Program (EMP) authority between Courts and Metro; matter escalated to Nevada Supreme Court.
- Positive collaboration reported among Henderson, Las Vegas, and other partners.

Domestic Violence

- Standardizing DV investigative practices across law enforcement and hospitals, including strangulation-related cases.
- Addressing staff shortages, case delays, and workflow inefficiencies.
- Improving victim experience, including reducing repeated retelling for Extended Temporary Protection Orders.
- Developing a structured Domestic Violence Fatality Review process aligned with national best practices.
- Continuing efforts to improve consistency across jurisdictions (Las Vegas, NLV, Henderson).

DUI

- A subcommittee member was not present to report out.

II. New Business Requests or Future Agenda Items

- Members encouraged to raise items; Henderson submitted appreciation for the Deflection & Diversion program.
- Discussion about need for future presentations (e.g., resource mapping, provider deep dives, sequential intercept training).
- Interest in tracking provider quality to avoid inappropriate referrals or mismatched services.
