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DESERT CONSERVATION PROGRAM

The Desert Conservation Program (DCP) manages Endangered Species Act compliance on behalf of Clark County and the cities of Boulder City, Henderson, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, Mesquite and the Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT) (collectively, the Permittees) through implementation of the Clark County Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan (MSHCP) and associated Section 10(a)(1)(B) incidental take permit. The MSHCP and permit allow private landowners to develop land in Clark County without the need for individual project-by-project consultations and negotiation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife (USFWS) to comply with the Endangered Species Act, providing a streamlined process for compliance. In exchange for this permit, the DCP implements actions to mitigate impacts from development. These actions include research, acquisition of sensitive habitats, habitat restoration, public information and education, the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line, and installation and maintenance of fencing along roadways to reduce tortoise mortality.

Permit Amendment

The DCP continues to pursue a major amendment to the MSHCP and incidental take permit. This amendment would allow for additional take authorization in Clark County while providing long-term assurances to the Clark County community for continued economic growth.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Continued to coordinate with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Bureau of Land Management to discuss issues related to the proposed MSHCP amendment; held quarterly coordination meeting on August 3, 2022.
- Continued to work with Permittees on a proposed federal lands bill that will support efforts to obtain an amended MSHCP; draft legislation was introduced in March 2021.
- Continued to administer a contract with WRA

Environmental Consultants to assist with the preparation of documents and analyses that will support development of the MSHCP amendment. This quarter, drafts were developed or revised for Chapter 6.4 (monitoring and adaptive management), the Bird Springs Valley cooperative management agreement, and the MSHCP implementing agreement.

- This quarter site visits were conducted for field verification of photo interpretations.
- Established accuracy assessment plots and began field preparations for collecting accuracy assessment points.
- An Amendment to the contract was approved to the Board of County Commissioners to reorganize the project for SNLMA funding of the Fine Scale mapping. SNPLMA funding the Fine Scale Mapping Project nomination is still pending but was recommended for funding by the working group.
- Continue to administer a contract with SWCA
 Environmental Consultants to conduct avian surveys to improve knowledge of ecology and distribution of proposed covered avian species. Year 2 surveys were completed in early June and a final project report data have been submitted.
- Continued to administer a contract with SWCA
 Environmental Consultants to conduct bat surveys to improve knowledge of ecology and distribution of proposed covered bat species. Acoustic surveys continued this quarter and roost surveys began in August, 2022.

- Completed a contract with Ventajas, LLC to conduct research on conflicts and encumbrances within the proposed Special Management Areas that will serve as the Reserve System under an amended MSHCP. The summary reports for the Stump Springs special management areas was completed this quarter.
- Continue to administer a contract with Ebbin, Moser + Skaggs, LLP to provide legal counsel services in support of

BOULDER CITY CONSERVATION EASEMENT (BCCE)

The incidental take permit requires the establishment of a conservation easement in the Eldorado Valley to be managed and protected for the benefit of the desert tortoise (*Gopherus agassizzi*) as partial mitigation for the take of desert tortoise and its habitat. The BCCE was established between Clark County and Boulder City in July of 1995 to fulfill this requirement.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Continued coordination with utility companies based in the Energy Zone in order to meet desert conservation and restoration goals.
- Continued mapping and assessment of unauthorized roads and other disturbances to guide prioritization of restoration activities on the BCCE.
- Gothic Landscape, Inc. has completed scheduled maintenance of shrubs planted in late 2021 to restore a decommissioned road located in valuable desert tortoise habitat at the BCCE (2017-GOTHIC-1745A).
- The National Park Service completed spring/summer weed surveys and control at the BCCE through an interlocal agreement. They also presented at the annual MSHCP Progress Report Symposium in August. The presentation slides can be viewed on the DCP website (2021-NPS-2005D).

RIPARIAN RESERVE UNITS

The incidental take permit stipulates that take of covered avian species is conditioned upon the acquisition of private lands in desert riparian habitats along the Muddy and Virgin rivers and the Meadow Valley wash. To comply with this permit condition, the DCP has acquired properties with riparian habitat along the Muddy and Virgin rivers in Clark County. These properties serve to mitigate impacts to covered species and conserve habitats and important connectivity corridors.

Muddy River Reserve Unit

- Submitted applications to change the place of use for Muddy River water right permits in prior quarter. These applications will support future Muddy River Reserve revegetation efforts and are currently under review.
- Continued monthly data collection on groundwater monitoring wells.
- Attended monthly meetings with Muddy River Biological Advisory Committee.

Virgin River Reserve Unit

- Continued monitoring of Mormon Mesa parcel for browsing and trampling by trespass cattle, and nonnative plant species.
- Continued management of NPS' Invasive Plant Management Team for survey of vegetation and maintenance activities for enhancement of native riparian species.
- Request to adjudicate hydrobasins 222, 223, and 224, was submitted in Q2 2020 to Nevada Division of Water Resources. Currently under review.
- Examined inventory of water rights and determined that fifty-eight (58) surface water rights and twelve (12) groundwater rights could be conveyed to the Nevada Division of Wildlife (NDOW). Board of County Commissioners approved proposed conveyance of water rights. The State approved the conveyance in Q2 2022. Staff will coordinate with NDOW to update the ownership of each water right with the State of Nevada Division of Water Resources.
- Collaborated with USFWS on project that is attempting to identify the decline of screwbean mesquite trees along the Virgin River. Preparing a scope of work to expand monitoring and identify mitigation options.
- Participated in Virgin River Coalition meeting.

Property Acquisition

• A willing seller contacted RPM with a parcel along the Virgin River they are interested in selling. DCP is currently evaluating the parcel to determine if an offer should be sent.

Other

- Continued management of contract with SWCA to evaluate archaeological resources.
- Continued management of contract with SWCA to conduct avian surveys on riparian properties. Surveys began in Q2, including point count surveys, southwestern willow flycatcher (SWFL) and yellow-billed cuckoo (YBCU) protocol surveys, and nest monitoring. The final report will be delivered in October 2022.
- Participated in meetings with Clark County Regional Flood District for development of an In Lieu Fee Program.

EXTERNAL AGENCY COORDINATION AND ASSISTANCE

In order to keep well informed on the current and future land use impacts to Clark County, the DCP will review and potentially provide comments on issues relevant to Clark County. As a public agency, the DCP also provides data as requested to interested parties.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Continued to serve as a cooperating agency to the Bureau of Land Management's Gold Butte Implementation Plan project.
- Continue to serve as a cooperating agency for the Bureau of Land Management's Logandale Trails Resource Management Plan Amendment; a cooperating agency meeting was held on August 2.
- Prepared letters documenting Endangered Species Act compliance for projects requiring the submittal of map revisions to the Federal Emergency Management Agency; 2 letters were prepared this quarter.
- Continue to meet with solar developers to conduct initial project reviews and identify concerns/issues; met with 3 companies this quarter.
- Continued to meet quarterly with the Department of Aviation to aid and support the development of the Southern Nevada Supplemental Airport.
- Serve as a cooperating agency to the Bureau of Land Management's Copper Rays Solar Project; a cooperating agency meeting was held on September 22, 2022.
- Continued mapping and GIS support on Southern Nevada Economic Development and Conservation Act
- Continued to participate in the Eastern Mojave Conservation Collaborative steering team.

WILD DESERT TORTOISE ASSISTANCE

The DCP implements numerous conservation actions to benefit the desert tortoise and to assist with recovery efforts. Two of the key projects implemented to reduce the impacts of development on wild desert tortoises include operation of the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line and the implementation of a translocation program, conducted in cooperation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Desert Tortoise Recovery Office. Additional projects that benefit wild desert tortoise populations include the construction and maintenance of over 400 miles of desert tortoise exclusionary fencing, and a wide variety of desert tortoise monitoring and research projects (refer to report section on the Adaptive Management Program).

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line

- Continued to administer a contract with Ecocentric to provide support for the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line and in conducting health assessments for tortoises that are removed from construction sites.
- Preformed health assessments on 8 tortoises.
- Treated 3 tortoises for Upper Respiratory Tract Disease
- One call was received from the Wild Desert Tortoise Assistance Line during this reporting period with 1 tortoise picked up from a construction site and placed into quarantine.

ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Ironwood Consulting completed their final project report and submitted final data for the Rare Plant Surveys project. They also presented at the annual MSHCP Progress Report Symposium in August. The presentation slides can be viewed on the DCP website (2017-IRONWOOD-1775A).
- U.S. Geological Survey continued to study rare plant propagation for this project through an interlocal agreement. Research activities included seed germination studies, seed longevity studies, collection of seed from plants grown as part of this project, and maintenance of plants propagated in previous seasons. Dr. Lesley DeFalco also presented at the annual MSHCP Progress Report Symposium in August. The presentation slides can be viewed on the DCP website (2019-USGS-1990A).
- U.S. Department of Agriculture Agricultural Research Service continued to identify bees captured during the field season and assessed the viability of collected *Arctomecon californica* seeds. They also presented at the annual MSHCP Progress Report Symposium in August. The presentation slides can be viewed on the <u>DCP website</u> (2021-USDA_ARS-2085A).
- University of Nevada, Las Vegas continued field studies for Phase 2 of our Riparian Plan-Pollinator Ecology research. Activities included vegetations surveys, sweep netting, willow flower surveys, soil sampling, and soil property analyses. They also presented at the annual MSHCP Progress Report Symposium in August. The presentation slides can be viewed on the <u>DCP website</u> (2021-UNVL-2065A).

- SWCA completed this year's avian surveys at DCP's riparian reserve units

- DCP staff completed this year's annual acoustic bat monitoring at five riparian reserve sites. The data will be analyzed next quarter.
- Ironwood Consulting began preparations for county-wide autumn surveys of Blue Diamond cholla (2021-IRONWOOD-2080A).
- Initiated a contract for adding the Niles Herbarium Dataset to the NDNH database.
- Continued administering the contract for Reptile Monitoring and data collection

ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

As a requirement of the incidental take permit, the DCP is required to have an Adaptive Management Program (AMP) in order to gauge the effectiveness of existing conservation measures, propose alternative conservation measures as the need arises and to deal with changed or unforeseen circumstances.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE


ACTIVITIES FOR THIS QUARTER

- Continued development of the 2023-2025 Implementation Plan and Budget process with stakeholders. A draft budget for non-discretionary projects has been prepared; additional recommendations for discretionary projects are due next quarter. A public draft report is expected to be available in November 2022.
- Processed vendor payments: 49 invoices, 45 accepted (92%), 4 rejected (8%).
- Fiscal Year (FY) 22 Budgets reconciled for end of year close and rolled into new fiscal year. Expenditures for FY23 continue to be monitored regularly to ensure appropriate spending and reporting occur.
- Phase 1 of converting all the existing credit card terminals to the new processor, Wells Fargo, is completed.
 Phase 2 of converting the existing web

- and IVR systems has been completed. Phase 3 is in process to establish e-payments services for County departments that did not currently offer e-payments.
- Continued production of the desert tortoise specialty license plate and plates are being distributed at Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles (DMVs). Active plates are currently exceeding the 1,000 minimum threshold.
- Continued oversight of the SNPLMA Round 16 – Round 18 projects totaling \$16,509,396 in the County's financial system. The projects continue to be monitored for progress and reimbursement.
- Received reimbursement for SNPLMA projects: Round 16 – zero draw downs this quarter.

DCP staff is responsible for ensuring that land disturbed pursuant to the MSHCP is accounted for and monies are collected and deposited in the Section 10 special reserve fund established under the MSHCP. Below are charts which outline the total amount of fees collected and acres disturbed for the period 2001-2022.

Acres of Disturbance* (by calendar year)






