The event is being held from 4 to 7 p.m on Friday, Sept. 10, at Fire Station #38, 1755 Silver Hawk Ave. Please enter at Serene and Tamarus.

Residents will be able to drop off computers and other electronics to be recycled, receive information on car seats and have a car seat checked, safely dispose of medication (no needles, powders or liquids will be accepted), and receive a flu shot or COVID-19 shot all from the comfort of their car.

"I am pleased to bring the next Curbside Care to Silverado Ranch. Thanks to the Clark County Fire Department and other community partners we are able to offer these free services to residents from the comfort of their car," said Commissioner Naft. "This is a great opportunity to get your shots and to safely dispose of expired medications and old computers, phones and other electronics. We also encourage parents with young children to stop to get your car seats adjusted."

CLARK COUNTY MAKES IMPROVEMENT TO FOOD BANK

Clark County replaced the pavement at the Colorado River Food Bank, an upgrade that makes it easier to load and unload donations there. "This was a much-needed improvement that will make it easier for the food bank to move heavy pallets and forklifts around the property," Commissioner Michael Naft said. "The new 2,600-square-foot parking lot is made of reinforced concrete, which can withstand heavy loads and extreme heat better than the asphalt that was there previously."


