2019 Hump N' Bump at Logandale Trails

Hump 'N' Bump is an internationally recognized, low-speed, two-day event, where participants in full-sized 4×4 off-road vehicles are guided over existing trails of varying difficulty in and around the Logandale trails and Valley of Fire recreation area. The event includes guided trail rides, vendor booths, spectator events, training seminars, bonfire, BBQ dinner, raffles, and special events that change annually.










TIP Challenge Celebrates Wild Horses and Burros

From November 1st through the 3rd, Clark County's Horseman's Park was the site of two competitions that showcased the beauty and versatility of wild horses and burros that were all recently gathered in Nevada. The first competition was the Las Vegas TIP Challenge. The Trainer Incentive Program (TIP) was started by the Mustang Heritage Foundation as a way to connect potential adopters with wild horses and burros at BLM holding facilities. TIP trainers work to "gentle" mustangs and burros using natural horsemanship techniques. The Las Vegas TIP Challenge is just one of many events across the country that allow TIP trainers to demonstrate their skills, raise awareness of these versatile animals, and promote adoption. The trainers purchase or adopt their animal and then work with them for about 90 days leading up to the competition. Mustangs are considered gentle when they are able to be walked on a halter, will pick up all four feet, and will load and unload from a trailer - but the skills demonstrated by the animals and trainers during the Challenge far exceeded those benchmarks. A total of 42 horses and 3 burros competed in a variety of events including Handling and Conditioning, Trial Class, and Freestyle - a routine set to music showing the skills and showmanship of the team. The groups were divided into adult, youth and burro classes. Teams traveled from all over the United States, with the furthest competitor coming all the way from Florida! Many of the horses in the competition were available for adoption after the event. One mare named Nova (middle right photo), that was trained right here in Las Vegas, was adopted to be trained as a future police horse!



In addition to the competitions that were taking place in both arenas throughout the weekend there were also untrained horses available for adoption, trainer Mustang Maddy gave several performances, Extreme Wylene (who was featured in the movie "Wild Horse Wild Ride) gave an incredible demonstration, and attendees were able to meet competitors and their equine companions.

This event was sponsored by the Mustang Heritage foundation and contributions were made by countless other oragnizations and individuals - but Amber Lynne and Isidro Espinoza are the

people that really made it all happen. Thank you for your dedication and for bringing such a great event to Las Vegas to showcase America's own wild horses and burros!

All of that training was put to the test when Hanna's music wouldn't work at the last minute for the Freestyle portion of the Challenge. Hanna quickly put together a new routine to the song "Carwash" and the result was fantastic - complete with sponges, shower caps, and plenty of sparkles! Overall, Hanna and Cleopatra came in 8th place out of 25 adult competitors. Congratulations to this great team! Wrangler

Dillon and Wrangler took home many awards including 3rd place overall in the Youth Division and the Rookie Youth Buckle. 
He continues to be the number one helper around the ranch. His duties lately have included chicken feed bag inspection, pig house construction, and front gate greeting with the dogs.
