To get to Peace Park, head south on the 15 and exit to the right at Jean. Head west for about 7 miles and turn left on Sandy Valley Road. The road will turn and take you west through a mountain pass. At the bottom of the hill, turn right on Cherokee, which will turn to the left and become Quartz. Follow Quartz west until it ends. Peace Park and all of the festivities will be on your right.



Rocky's Road: Journey of an Orphaned Burro

This is part 2 of an on-going series. When Rocky joined our herd in November, we knew that he had been left orphaned because his mom had been killed by the male burros in the herd. We didn't know that we were embarking on a new chapter in the beautiful and heartbreaking story of his mom, Jenny.

As Wild Horse and Burro Program Volunteers, Dave and Tara Kilpatrick have been documenting the wild horse herd near Goodsprings for many years. On April 2, 2006, the Kilpatricks came across Mama and Dawn, two mares that they knew. However, with them was a young Jenny. She was the first female burro that they had seen in this area of the Red Rock Herd Management Area. Jenny forged a strong bond with Feather, a palomino horse in the herd.

Over the next couple of years, Jenny continued to live with "Mama's band." She was at ease with the group and even played with the horses and foals. In June of 2009, Jenny had her first foal, a little boy named Cactus Jack (3rd photo down) Over the next 6 years, Jenny went on to have 3 more foals: Joshua Jack, Yucca Jack, and Mojave Jack. Throughout this time, Jenny remained the only female burro in the area and she dealt with the aggressive behavior that is not uncommon among adult jacks in the wild. At least one of her foals was killed by the jacks, as well as foals from the wild horses.

In July 2017, the Kilpatricks saw that Jenny was pregnant again. The next time they saw her was on a hillside on October 27th with her foal that appeared to be one week old. Less than 2 weeks later, on November 9th, Tara received a call from workers at the Las Vegas Rock quarry about an orphaned foal whose mom had died the day before. In coordination with Tabby Romero, BLM's Wild Horse and Burro Specialist, Tara and Dave loaded the little guy into their vehicle and took him to their home in Sandy Valley. Later that day he came to our place where he has found his forever home.

Rocky continues to grow like a weed. He turned 3 months old on January 20th. When we are home he gets free range of our entire property. He loves to visit with the horses, check out the chickens and goats, and nuzzle on our dog Purdy. But, his favorite activity with "helping" us with chores around the ranch. As you can imagine, his "help" can make even simple tasks into quite an adventure. Like most young animals (and human babies, too) Rocky likes to nibble and experience things using his mouth. We are working on getting him to bite things like alfalfa cubes rather than our butts and elbows! He is getting really good at his "hee–haw" and greets us with a hearty bray when we get home at night. He was weaned off of formula last week and seems to be having no problem filling his belly with alfalfa.
