Moapa Valley Days will take place March 13–14, 2015 in Moapa Valley, NV. This annual event provides a wide range of activities for locals and visitors, and has drawn the community together to make it a success. Activities will include:

Rural Road Trip of the Month: Valley of Fire

Dedicated in 1935, Valley of Fire is Nevada's largest and oldest state park - and quite possibly the most appropriately named! The 150 million year old sandstone formations within the park range in color from creamy white to deep, vivid red and every shape you can imagine, including arches, beehives and an elephant. Enjoying the beauty of the park from your vehicle along the scenic drive is great, but there are many ways to get out and experience the park including hiking, picnicking, and camping. Trails are available for hikers of all ages and ability levels. There are also picnic areas including shade structures and restrooms in multiple places throughout the park. For those feeling a little more adventurous, there are individual campsites and three group camping areas.

A great place to begin your exploration of the park is at the visitor's center. It houses extensive interpretive displays and information about the plants, animals, early residents and geology of the area. The park is open from sunrise to sunset and the visitor's center is open daily from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

March is a good time to visit the park not only due to the pleasant spring weather, but also because the Nevada Division of State Parks is hosting hikes, presentations, programs and children's activities every weekend all month long.

Getting there: From Las Vegas, drive north on the I-15 approximately 35 miles to State Hwy 169 (exit 75.) Head east for 15 miles to the west entrance station. The entrance fee is \$8 per car for Nevada residents (\$10 for non-residents.)

Here's some interesting trivia to get you ready for St. Patrick's Day on March 17th. (And, don't forget to wear green so you don't get pinched!)

- The very first St. Patrick's Day parade was not in Ireland it was in Boston in 1737. The largest parade in the U.S. is in New York City, has been held since 1762 and draws more than one million spectators.
- St. Patrick wasn't Irish he was born in Britain and was brought to Ireland as a slave when he was 16. His birth name is actually Maewyn Succat.
- Old Irish superstition says that it is unlucky to marry on Saturday, but the St. Patrick's day is supposed to be the luckiest day of the year to get married.
- It is said that a four-leaf shamrock will bring good luck in gambling and racing, and will render witchcraft powerless. But, one must carry it with them at all times. Giving it away or showing it to others will cause the luck to fail.
- A leprechaun is really an Irish Shoemaker with a reputation for being rich, but mean.
- According to legend, you can obtain a leprechaun's pot of gold by capturing him and not taking your eyes off him until you get your gold. Fairy law requires the leprechaun to be honest with you if captured, but only for as long as you look him in the eye. It does not forbid tricks, only lying, but as soon as you look away the leprechaun can vanish, lie to you, or anything else he can dream up.
- A small patch of carefully landscaped land sits in the middle of a road in Portland, Oregon, but it's not just roadside greenery to perk up a neighborhood street. It's actually a park dedicated to leprechauns. Local legend says that a reporter wrote a series of columns about the country's only leprechaun colony in 1947. The reporter, Dick Fagan, spotted one of the leprechauns digging a hole in the spot outside his window and captured it. He used his wish to get a park of his own, but the leprechaun tricked him and gave him the hole in the ground instead. The two-foot long patch of ground became an official city park in 1976 and serves as the epicenter of the town's St. Patrick's Day festivities.



- Some legends say leprechauns carry one gold coin for every year they have been alive.
- The leprechaun is said to have cousins and one of them is the "clurichaun" who is a night form of a leprechaun. He only goes out at night after his chores to get drunk and ride the sheep and dogs. If he was treated right, he would guard that individual's wine cellar, but if mistreated, the clurichaun would wreak havoc on that home, spoil the wine stock and follow that person around to harass him.

To celebrate Dr. Seuss' birthday on March 2, here's a little information about the author as well as a few fun quotes from his many books.

Theodor Seuss Geisel, better known to the world as the beloved Dr. Seuss, was born in 1904 on Howard Street in Springfield. Massachusetts. Ted's father, Theodor Robert, and grandfather were brewmasters in the city. His mother, Henrietta Seuss Geisel, often soothed her children to sleep by "chanting" rhymes remembered from her youth. Ted credited his mother with both his ability and desire to create the rhymes for which he became so well known.

At the time of his death on September 24, 1991, Ted had written and illustrated 44 children's books, including such all-time favorites as Green Eggs and Ham, Oh, the Places You'll Go, Fox in Socks, and How the Grinch Stole Christmas. His books had been translated into more than 15 languages. Over 200 million copies had found their way into homes and hearts around the world. Besides the books, his works have provided the source for eleven children's television specials, a Broadway musical and a feature-length motion picture. Other major motion pictures are on the way. His honors included two Academy awards, two Emmy awards, a Peabody award and the Pulitzer Prize.
