


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# Mt. Charleston Resident Competes in US Open

Mt. Charleston resident, Lauren Olson, wears many hats: librarian, neighbor, volunteer. But, this past month she traded all those hats for a visor as she competed in the US Open Pickleball Championships in Florida.

So, just what is Pickleball? Pickleball was invented by some friends on Bainbridge Island in 1965. The 3 men, one of which was a Washington State Congressman and Lieutenant Governor, noticed that their families had nothing to do one summer afternoon. They gathered up a variety of rackets, paddles, and balls that they found around the property and invented a new game using their old badminton court. They developed a set of rules that combined elements of tennis, badminton, & ping pong – and always kept in mind



Along with the growth in popularity has come increased competition, tournaments, and player ratings. Players are rated based on tournament results, recommendation by tournament directors, and input from fellow players. Ratings are divided into age categories with a 5.0 as the highest. After just 3 years of playing and winning a silver medal in the Mountain Regionals in Utah just a week before the US Open, Lauren is ranked at a 4.5.

This year's US Open hosted 2,000 athletes from 47 states and 17 countries. Lauren and her mixed doubles partner competed against 41 other athletes and finished in the top one third. Now she has her eyes set on attending the Nationals in November which are held at the prestigious Indian Wells Tennis Garden near Palm Springs, California.

Clark County will be opening its first pickleball courts at Lone Mountain Regional Park this August. Two new courts will be constructed as part of the new Cougar Creek Park which is scheduled to break ground in the next month be completed by May, 2019. There has been discussion about adding pickleball courts in other parts of the County, so there may be one coming soon to an area near you.







And, as many of you are probably asking – where did the name come from? One theory is that the wife of one of the inventors called it pickleball because "the combination of different sports reminded me of the pickle boat in crew where oarsmen were chosen from the leftovers of other boats". A second theory is that the game was officially named after a family dog named Pickles who would chase the ball and run off with it.

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# Rocky's Road: Journey of an Orphaned Burro

This is part 5 of an on-going series.

Due to a scheduling conflict, Rocky was not able to receive his freeze brand in April, but he was able to be gelded (neutered.) So, in just a few minutes, he went from a Jack (intact stallion) to a Gelding (neutered.) We had Rocky neutered for a couple of different reasons. First, it will help him to have a better temperament. Jacks can be unpredictable and aggressive as they age. While Rocky's nibbles and head butts might seem cute now, they could be dangerous with the hormones of an adult. Secondly, we do not want to have any accidental pregnancies. Although he is not in contact with our mare or any other female horses or donkeys, we don't want to take a chance. Plus, there are so many burros in need of forever homes that we would "opt to adopt" if we ever chose to bring another donkey into our family.

The actual gelding procedure, which was done at our ranch, was relatively quick and efficient. From the time he was sedated until he was up walking around was only about 30 minutes. He was a little subdued the first day, but after that he bounced right back to his usual goofy self.

One of the most common questions I get is: "What's the difference between a burro and a donkey?" Well, at first, I honestly wasn't sure either. There are a lot of different terms that are used when referring to burros, so, here's a little "Donkey Dictionary" for all of us.

Ass: Technically, this is the term to be used when referring to a member of the genus equus asinus. The hoarseness of its voice, or bray, depends upon two small peculiar cavities situated at the bottom of the larynx. In groups, we refer to a pace of asses.

<u>Burro:</u> In Spanish, the word for 'donkey' is 'burro'. As a general rule, the term burro is heard West of the Mississippi and the term Donkey, east of the Mississippi.

<u>Donkey:</u> This term is unique to the English language and was probably derived from the Flemish word donnekijn. Most authorities consider that the word comes from the dun (gray-brown) color and the suffix 'key' meaning 'small'. Thus 'a little dun animal', a 'dun-key'. In groups, we refer to a herd of donkeys.

Foal: This term is used for a baby donkey or a baby mule

**Gelding:** This is the term used for a gelded donkey stallion.

Jack or Jackass: This term refers to a donkey stallion.

Jennet or Jenny: This is the name of a female donkey.

**John:** This term is used for a male mule.

Molly: This term is used for a female mule.

Mule and Hinny: These terms are used to describe hybrid animals, each having a donkey parent and a horse parent. In 99.9% of cases, mules and hinnies are sterile. When a donkey stallion is bred with a horse mare, the offspring is called a mule. When a horse stallion is bred with a donkey jennet, the offspring is called a hinny. In groups, we refer to a barren of mules.
