On Wednesday, October 28th, the entire Valley School and Sandy community members looked on as Commissioner Susan Brager, School Board Trustee Carolyn Edwards, CCSD Superintendent Pat Skorkowsky and other dignitaries picked up bright red shovels and turned the dirt commemorate the groundbreaking of the expansion of the school. project is a result of years of hard work and dedication by Judge Dawn Haviland, the Sandy Valley School Boosters and the many members of the community that attended School Board meetings and made their voices heard.

The expansion will consist of 4 Phases, with the first Phase consisting of a state of the art gymnasium building. The building will include home and visitor locker rooms, a music room, bleacher seating for 300, fitness and weight rooms, a PE classroom, a concession stand, and gathering spaces both inside and outside of the building. Future phases will include additional classroom space and upgrades to the baseball field.

Halloween Fun Throughout the Month in Sandy Valley





In February 2015, the Clark County Commissioners voted unanimously to approve an ordinance officially making Moapa Valley friendly to Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) use. Unbranded highlights the American West

We have never featured a movie review in Rural Connections before, but when a movie like *Unbranded* comes along it just warrants trying something new.

On the surface, *Unbranded* is a documentary about 4 young men just out of college that want to have one last wild adventure before they enter the "real" world. However, from the very first scene it is clear that the movie is so much more.



It is a love letter to the American West, a reminiscence of days gone by, a tale of friendship, struggle and survival, and a heartfelt look at the complex story of our public lands.

The film follows the 4 young men as they buy and train 16 wild mustangs and then take them on a 3,000 mile trek from Mexico, through 5 western states, to the border of Canada. Along the way they face many challenges, pass through amazingly beautiful landscapes, meet some interesting people, learn about themselves, and show the beauty and resilience of America's wild horses. As in many other western states, the wild horse issue is particularly relevant here in Nevada. *Unbranded* presents a well-balanced view of this complicated and emotional issue – and manages not to place blame or vilify either side.

And, even if you just watch it just for the scenery and the horses, you won't be disappointed.

Winter Parking in Mt. Charleston & Lee Canyon

Lee Canyon (Hwy 156) is your best option. Open places include Lee Meadows, Sawmill Picnic Area, Bristlecone Trail for snowshoe hiking and various pullouts on Lee Canyon Road (Hwy 156) & Deer Creek Highway (Hwy 158). Roadside parking is **prohibited** between Lee Meadows and the Ski Resort in Lee Canyon (Hwy 156). Roadside parking is **prohibited** in Kyle Canyon (Hwy 157), except in designated areas, past the intersection of Hwy 157 and Deer Creek Hwy (Hwy 158).

Snow Play Safety Tips

- Consider wearing a helmet while sledding
- * Make sure paths are clean and weather is good
- Never sled near roads or vehicles
- Avoid dangerous objects like large rocks and trees
- Be aware of others so you don't run into them! Sleds can reach speeds of up to 20 mph
- No sledding in areas with less than 12 inches of snow
- No snow play on private or "closed" areas

The National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC) in partnership with the Mt. Charleston Fire Protection District is excited to offer the Wildland Fire Assessment Program (WFAP).

About the Class

WFAP is a joint effort by the U.S. Forest Service and the NVFC to provide departments with training on how to properly conduct assessments for homes located in the wildland-urban interface. This is the first program targeted to volunteers that specifically prepares a firefighter or a non-operational department volunteer for how to conduct an assessment, what to look for during an assessment, as well as provides printed materials needed to help their community become more fire adapted. The course is a four-part, train-the-trainer series that covers understanding the WUI problem, identifying the zones, evaluating the home, and available resources.

About the Instructor



Steve McClintock has been in the fire service for over 35 years, including 10 years with a volunteer department. He is retired from Clark County Fire Department in Las Vegas, where he began as a firefighter and was promoted through the ranks of Engineer, Paramedic, and finished his career as Rural Coordinator. In the role of Rural Coordinator, Steve was in charge of 350 volunteers and covered 8,000 square miles. He has real compassion for volunteers and what they do for their community. Having been on a paid department, he finds it unbelievable

how the volunteers have so much commitment. Steve is currently on a National Incident Management Team as an Operations Section Chief and has his own Type 3 Incident Management Team in Nevada. He is a past-President of the Nevada State Firefighter's Association and currently holds a position on the board of directors. Steve represents Nevada on the NVFC Board of Directors and is also an NVFC Executive Committee member. He lives in Henderson with his wife Marla and their five children.
