2.8 Measures to Minimize, Mitigate, and Monitor Impacts of Take

The following sections delineate, by responsible agency, measures proposed to minimize, mitigate, and monitor the impacts of take of species covered by the MSHCP. The measures have been derived primarily from the existing and proposed additional conservation measures identified in Appendix A that address the potential threats to each ecosystem and in Appendix B that address the potential threats to each species. Existing conservation measures are identified in italics in the text.

The following are recommended conservation actions to be undertaken by each local, state, and Federal agency participating in the MSHCP. The conservation actions include public information and education, adaptive management, and land use policies and actions. For adaptive management, the conservation actions include research, monitoring for trends, and inventories to assess the status of habitats and species. The land use policies and actions include habitat restoration and enhancement measures, protective measures which may include regulatory prescriptions, use restrictions, or other land

- Educating construction site personnel about reporting and collecting wild desert tortoises for pick-up by DCP staff




EDUCATION PROGRAM





Mojave Max Education Program

- Started in 2000
- Receive requests through the Mojave Max website for Mojave Max assemblies, individual Tortoise Talks, and outreach events
- Partner with a consultant who helps administer the Mojave Max assemblies, Tortoise Talks and outreach events (Get Outdoors Nevada)
 - Pandemic protocols caused some of these to be done virtually during the last two years, but we expect all aspects of the program to return to in-person

2021-2022 Mojave Max Education Program Accomplishments


- In response to the pandemic, new content was created to reach CCSD students who were learning virtually, including the Mojave Max "Ask-a-Ranger" Q & A sessions, which reached nearly 1,000 students.
- In the 2021-2022 school year, nearly 4,000 students were reached through assemblies and virtual Tortoise Talks.
- 2,727 students submitted their guesses for the emergence contest.


PUBLIC COMMUNICATION

- Mojave Max is now on TikTok (at the urging of students who participated in assemblies last year).








FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS





- Construction personnel will soon be able to report wild tortoises on construction sites via the FixIt Clark County app
- Tortoise Awareness and Invasive Species Education for OHV Community will increase through attendance and participation in events (including Hump 'n' Bump in Logandale, NV in October)
- Mylar balloon danger education and collection competition campaign (launching in September, in conjunction with the BCPD officers who patrol the BCCE)
- Expanding desert conservation education to students in Junior and Senior high school.
- Creation of the DCP Ambassador Outreach program
- Creation of additional resources for teachers to utilize for teaching Desert Conservation to all grade levels (i.e. creation of additional Google Classroom content, and 'travel trunks'.)
