The **STUFF IN YOUR GARAGE** and what **TO DO ABOUT IT**

Household Hazardous Waste includes oil, auto fluids, gasoline, pesticides, fertilizers, cleaners, adhesives, pool chemicals, batteries, paint thinners, solvents, light bulbs, and electronics. *



FOLLOW label instructions



KEEP in original containers



DON'T MIX leftover products



RECYCLE or **DISPOSE** of containers properly

WHAT IS THIS STUFF and HOW DO I GET RID OF IT?



AUTOMOTIVE PRODUCTS

Used auto fluids contain toxins that contaminate water if improperly discarded.

- · Never pour oil or fluids down the drain or in the gutter
- Transport in clean, labeled containers
- Keep fluids separate to ensure recycling is possible
- Recycle at participating auto shops or service centers
- Search for drop-off: earth911.com



MEDICATION DISPOSAL

Flushed medications persist in water systems and harm the environment.



- Avoid flushing or tossing in trash helps reduce accidental ingestion and drug misuse
- Drop off at police substations or participating pharmacies
- Info: cleanwaterteam.com and safe.pharmacy



LIGHT BULBS

Bulbs contain hazardous materials, which are dangerous if broken or landfilled.

- Recycle all bulb types: LED, CFL, incandescent, halogen
- Handle with care to avoid breakage
- Avoid tossing in household trash
- Search for drop-off: earth911.com



F-WASTF

Electronics contain valuable and toxic materials that pollute landfills and groundwater.

- Includes TVs, phones, computers, e-cigarettes, etc.
- Remove lithium batteries before disposal
- Donate or recycle to conserve resources
- Search for drop-off: earth911.com



PAINT

Oil-based paints and solvents are flammable and water-polluting.

- Never pour paint down the drain or in the gutter
- Solidify latex paint before placing in trash (e.g., with cat litter)
- Donate leftover usable paint to neighbors or community orgs

HOUSEHOLD CHEMICALS

Chemicals like pesticides and cleaners pose risks to people, pets, and water quality.

- Drop off on Household Hazardous Waste days at designated Republic Services sites
- Do not mix chemicals or dump down drains

BULK ITEM PICKUP

Improper disposal of bulk items can lead to illegal dumping and contamination.

- Must follow specific prep guidelines (e.g., wrapping mattresses, taping lids)
- Review full list and restrictions before placing items out

FIREARMS, AMMUNITION, FIREWORKS

These pose serious safety risks and should never be disposed of in trash.

Call LVMPD at 702-229-0291 for safe disposal instructions



BATTERIES

Improperly discarded batteries can leak harmful metals into the soil.

- Recycle dry-cell batteries, especially those with lead, mercury, or cadmium
- Use nickel hydride (NiMH) batteries when possible-they're safer and rechargeable
- Never place batteries in household trash or recycling bins
- Search for drop-off: earth911.com
