

**MINUTES OF THE
COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING (CDAC)
CDBG APPLICANT PRESENTATIONS**

**HELD AT THE CLARK COUNTY SOCIAL SERVICES BUILDING, ADMIN TRAINING ROOM,
3RD FLOOR, 1600 PINTO LANE COUNTY OF CLARK, NEVADA,
ON TUESDAY, February 17, 2026.**

Opening Ceremonies

Mr. Eric Jeng, Chairperson, called the meeting to order, and led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

- I. Public Comment – At this time, the Committee will hear comments from the public regarding items listed on the agenda as posted.

No public comments.

- II. Roll Call

Roll Call was completed by Karen Michelin, Manager with Clark County Community Housing Office. Committee attendance was noted. Karen Michelin noted that a quorum was present.

- III. Approve minutes for February 3, 2026, meeting (For Possible Action)

Ms. April Stewart made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 17, 2026, meeting. Ms. Geraldine Ramirez seconded the motion, and the motion was approved.

- IV. Presentation of 2026-2028 CDBG Applications

On behalf of the CDAC committee, Chairperson Eric Jeng welcomed the applicants, thanking them for their community work and anticipating the presentations. The Chairperson outlined the application presentation process, enabling all participants to ask and answer questions. He also advised if anyone on the committee has additional questions not asked during the presentation to please submit an email to a CDAC staff member.

Mr. Jeng gave brief instructions on how the presentations would be conducted. He then introduced the CDBG Grants Coordinator, Kent Golangco, and advised he would run the presentation portion of the meeting by introducing each applicant. Applicants will have three minutes to present highlighting key points of their projects. Chairperson Jeng made note that the committee would be hearing presentations from 15 CDBG Applicants. He then introduced Kent Golangco, who shared a brief presentation on the FY 2026-2028 CDBG program, available funding along, with other important details. As part of the development and community improvements, Clark County administers the Community Development Block Grant program. Kent informed the committee and the applicants that the program was designed to help improve living conditions, increase economic opportunities, and assist low-to moderate-income populations.

Kent shared that for FY 2026-2028, Clark County has approximately \$13.6 million in CDBG funding available. Of that sum, approximately \$2.5 million can be allocated to public services and up to \$11 million can be directed to capital improvements and other projects. The Community Housing Office (CHO) received over \$24 million in total requested funding and notes that projects from previous cycles may be prioritized. Initially, there were 22 applications, 17 of which made it through to full application, and 15 of which made it through to presentations. The 15 remaining applicants are still subject to a HUD eligibility review. All applicants are located in unincorporated Clark County, City of Las Vegas, and North Las Vegas.

Kent acknowledged that Clark County's FY 2026-2028 funding priorities include acquisition, rehabilitation, public facilities, infrastructure, improvements, and public services of which they have a cap of 15%; can also energy conservation, economic development, and job creation and retention.

Kent mentioned that the application scoring dates will take place from February 3-24, 2026, in ZoomGrants, for all CDAC members. Other important dates include the CDAC meeting on March 3, 2026, to make the final recommendations, and the Clark County Commissioners making the final decision on April 7, 2026.

1. Solutions of Change, Inc. – Behavioral Health & Family Stabilization Services for Justice Involved Youth

Target Population Low- and moderate-income youth ages 8–18 involved with juvenile justice/child welfare systems and their families including households experiencing trauma, housing instability, and economic hardship.

Estimated Number Served Approximately 100 unduplicated individuals per program year; 50 justice-involved youth/family units receiving counseling and supportive services; 50 youth/family units participating in the Youth Mental Wellness Summit.

Location 2310 Paseo del Prado, Building A, Unit A101–03 Las Vegas, NV 89102
Serving multiple Clark County census tracts

Project Completion Timeline Two-year project period: July 1, 2026 – June 30, 2028

CDBG Request / Percentage of Total Project Budget CDBG Request: \$143,000 - Total Project Cost: \$393,000; CDBG represents approximately 36% of the total project budget.

A committee member questioned the total program cost of \$393,000 and requested clarification on the specific uses of the funds, if these funds would be allotted solely for counselor hiring. They also asked if the applicant had explored potential opportunities for offering graduate-level continuing education programs to minimize expenses for students. The applicant provided a detailed response, outlining that funds are allocated toward comprehensive services including intake support, family support, and professional therapy sessions. Additionally, a specialized team is available for crisis intervention and foundational mental health support. Upon arrival, clients are greeted by well-prepared front desk staff that prioritizes client's well-being through various levels of care. Initiatives like Annual Youth Summit demonstrate their commitment. Furthermore, the organization

provides therapeutic support and resources for individuals impacted by the justice system, with significant funding allocated to staffing and referral services.

2. St. Jude's Ranch for Children – Clinical Therapy for Foster Children Homeless Youth

Target Population Foster Children ages 7-18 residing at the Boulder City Campus Homeless Youth ages 18-24 enrolled in one of our transitional and supportive housing programs.

Estimated Number Served 60 youth (nonduplicated) 15 foster children & 45 homeless youth

Location Boulder City Residential Foster Care Campus; Las Vegas Walk-in Services Office at Sahara/Rainbow Blvd.

Project Completion Timeline 12-month project period and at least 5 clients per month.

CDBG Request / Percentage of Total Project Budget CDBG Request: \$85,000 - Total Project Cost: \$250,000 – 32%

A committee member posed a question regarding the onsite therapist. According to the applicant, a doctor is onsite and leads the clinical therapy department, supported by a coordinator. The coordinator role includes providing services, while supplementary services would likely be sourced through contractual arrangements. A fellow committee member expressed confusion regarding the cost. In response to the inquiry, the applicant provided a detailed breakdown of the budget, outlining \$5,000 for administrative support and a total program cost of \$250,000, with \$80,000 being the amount requested. The applicant clarified that they could only discuss the overall financial spreadsheets and not the specific program details, noting that the clinical therapy program is an integral part of their broader initiatives and the cited figures corresponded to their current staffing structure. When questioned about the \$80,000 request being for a single counselor, the applicant confirmed that it would likely cover three contracted therapists who work on a floater basis. A committee member reviewing the application via Zoomgrants mentioned it seemed certain funds were to offset the difference between Medicaid payments and the amount due, but this wasn't part of the terms. The applicant replied in the negative.

3 Nevada Partners, Inc. – Community Learning Center

Target Population All participants will be low- to moderate-income (LMI) individuals residing in Clark County. Beneficiaries will primarily include youth facing barriers to employment and economic mobility, including limited access to industry-aligned training, career exposure, and professional networks.

Estimated Number Served The project will serve approximately 100 unduplicated youth ages 16–24 through career exposure and engagement activities. Up to 36 of these participants will be selected to participate in more intensive career pathway training through the STEM Center and Youth Empowerment Center

Project Completion Timeline July 2026-June 2028

CDBG Request / Percentage of Total Project Budget CDBG Request: \$75,000
CDBG represents approximately 23% of the total project budget

A committee member inquired if the program was comprehensive and if participants would be job-ready upon completion. The applicant responded affirmatively, mentioning that they have several models, and a new model will focus on earning credentials, potentially in cybersecurity as well as college credits. A fellow committee member raised concerns about faculty recruitment and student enrollment process. The applicant replied that their enrollment program is comparable to the CSUN application, and they were delighted to share specifics about the adopted programs.

4 HELP USA, Inc. – Empowering Employment for Veterans who Have Experienced Homelessness & People with Low Incomes

Target Population People from Clark County with low incomes living in HELP's Clark County: (1) transitional housing (shelters) for veterans experiencing homelessness or (2) permanent affordable housing

Estimated Number Served 225 adults with low incomes, includes serving 200 people via traditional supported employment services &100 people via art therapy

Location Serving HELP Genesis/Bonanza/Renaissance residents primarily at 1455 North Main Street, Las Vegas, NV 89101

Project Completion Timeline July 2026 – June 2028

CDBG Request / Percentage of Total Project Budget \$478,000; 100% of project budget.

A committee member inquired where the shelters are located. The applicant replied that they are transitional housing facilities situated downtown, with two located on Main Street and another on McKnight Street, noting that two are positioned across from the courtyard on Main Street. Another committee member requested statistical data on the success rate of these services. The applicant's statistics for 200 people serviced in various locations indicated that 58% had engagement with their case managers based on their figures. Another committee member inquired about the types of activities that will be provided at this facility. According to the applicant they will employ a full-time Art Therapist to conduct onsite training sessions and visits to the museum. They are also planning onsite workshops for employment specialists, which will cover job development, interview techniques, and training, ultimately preparing them for vocational training. A committee member asked about alternatives if they don't receive 100% funding from CDAC, and the applicant replied they would make adjustments, such as hiring part-time staff and other measures.

5 Foster Kinship – Enhanced Kinship Navigator Program

Target Population Low- to moderate-income kinship families in unincorporated Clark County caring for children who have experienced abuse or neglect

Estimated Number Served 120 kinship families raising approximately 216 children = 336 unique individuals.

Location Services provided from Foster Kinship’s Clark County office, in-home, or in the community; beneficiaries reside in unincorporated Clark County.

Project Completion Timeline Navigator services operate year-round; all families served by June 30 of each grant year.

CDBG Request / Percentage of Total Project Budget \$150,000 annually (\$300,000 over 2 years); 4%

A committee member asked if Foster Kinship had any referrals. The applicant responded that they have formal partnerships with the three child welfare agencies in Nevada, specifically for children in foster care custody who are being raised by relatives. These families are referred to the Foster Kinship program, which offers services related to foster care system involvement. The applicant also mentioned partnership in the community, including the Legal Aid Center in Southern Nevada, and having two DSS workers based at their office. Furthermore, child welfare agencies refer families from various school districts, and referrals also come through word of mouth from existing families who know other Kinship families. Another committee member questioned how long Foster Kinship program had been in existence, and the applicant answered that it has been operating since 2011.

6 Family Promise of Las Vegas – Family Bridge to Home Program

Target Population Families with minor children who are unsheltered or in immediate housing crisis.

Estimated Number Served 80 unduplicated families

Location Headquarters: 3110 E. Twain Ave, Las Vegas, NV 89121
Motel/Shelter Locations: Scattered Site

Project Completion Timeline June 30, 2028

CDBG Request / Percentage of Total Project Budget \$290,414; 55%

A committee member asked about the average stay duration per family. The applicant provided stated it was between 80 and 83 days, adding that 90-day reviews are performed to assess goal attainment. Another committee member asked about the timing of the follow-up case management, The applicant responded that they generally perform a 30-day follow-up to verify unit placement and an additional follow-up to after 90 days. The applicant further explained that one-year follow-up numbers are low due to factors like email changes, and relocation out of state, which makes tracking challenging. A committee member expressed concern regarding the 90-day policy. The applicant provided insight

into their utilization of the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to ensure clients do not repeatedly access services.

7 Las Vegas Clark County Library District – Office-In-A-Bag Program for Southern Nevada Regional Housing Authority Residents

Target Population Adults aged 18 to 64, residing in six SNRHA communities.

Estimated Number Served Ten (10) tech kits to unduplicated residents.

Location The six (6) communities are: Marble Manor, Marble Manor Annex, Villa Capri, Jones Gardens, Sherman Gardens, and Sherman Gardens Annex.

Project Completion Timeline The Library District estimates the project be completed over an 18-month period, progressing from launch and outreach in month 1-2 through training, monitoring, evaluation, and concluding with program closeout and future planning in month 18.

CDBG Request / Percentage of Total Project Budget \$50,335; 100%

A committee member questioned the applicant of the Office-In-A-Bag Program. The applicant detailed that the program includes a laptop, specialized software, business development tools, scanners, a label maker, and other resources necessary for identifying microbusiness opportunities. Another committee member asked for an explanation of a mobile workstation. The applicant elaborated that it is an economical, portable workspace that can be set up and taken down easily, catering to the mobile nature of microbusiness. A committee member asked if the program had prior experience. The applicant confirmed this is the first implementation of the program, noting the West Side Vegas branch had a Business Center built into it, but this program will be the first in support of that center. A committee member asked if they have any data on the success rate of this program as a model. The applicant's response highlighted that Las Vegas, as a GoDaddy Venture forward, boasts the second-highest number of microbusinesses, with more than 335 operating in the area and a rate of nearly 28 microbusinesses per 100 residents, showcasing a robust entrepreneurial presence and a significant need for digital tools. A different committee member asked if a contingency plan is included in this strategy to ensure the kits' safekeeping and prevent them from becoming lost. The applicant explained that the contingency plan is to ensure the Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) tag is used to track the kits' movement in and out of the branches. The 10 participants will be required to hold library cards, enabling them to check out the kits. Given that they are Housing Authority residents, the Housing Authority has partnered with their organization to guarantee proper usage of the kits by the children. When asked by a committee member if participants keep the kits upon program completion, the applicant indicated that the kits are intended as rewards for those participants who move forward with business plan development and project implementation.

8 Southern Nevada Health District – Mobile Health Van

Target Population Individuals experiencing homelessness and low-income residents with limited access to healthcare

Estimated Number Served Approximately 550 unduplicated individuals annually

Project location Mobile Outreach to encampments, partnered community events, and community-based locations

Project Completion Timeline Summer–Fall 2026 to early 2028

CDBG Request/Percentage of Total Project Budget \$300,000 / 100%

A committee member questioned the funding anticipated and the need for additional funding to replenish expended resources. The applicant responded that they had already discussed maintenance and operational costs with their facility team, which would be factored into the overall cost for the health department, not just the project. A committee member asked how the organization identifies people in need to participate in the program. The applicant replied that they work with community partners like Nevada Homeless Alliance and Shine A Light Foundation, who refer individuals to help districts and request their teams to provide services at outreach events. Their street medicine team also collaborates with different strike teams, including those for homeless population with Clark County, Boulder City, and Henderson. Furthermore, they have scheduled community outreach events, such as quarterly events with the City of North Las Vegas, where they bring their mobile unit. When questioned about staffing, the applicant stated that they currently have funding for a street medicine team including a provider, a nurse, and two community health workers, but are seeking funding to expand their team.

9 The Just One Project – Workforce Development Program

Target Population LMI working-age unemployed and underemployed Clark County residents seeking stable or higher-wage employment. Eligible clients will also have documented barriers inhibiting employment, such as limited transportation or lack of identification.

Estimated Number Served 200 unduplicated individuals annually.

Location 1401 N Decatur Blvd Ste. 34, Las Vegas NV 89108
Services open to qualifying Clark County residents.

Project Completion Timeline Workforce Development is an active program. Funding will be implemented immediately upon award and will be utilized to provide services throughout the grant period, 7/1/2026 - 6/30/2027

CDBG Request/Percentage of Total Project Budget \$75,000/36%

During the discussion, a committee member asked the success rate of the 200 participants. The applicant stated that their program, primarily restricted to individuals in housing programs like Operation Home, has yielded sufficient results. Impressively, the program achieved a 96% successful exit rate last year, with employment and sustainable income being crucial in promoting self-sufficiency. Given the high success rate, the applicant is looking to expand the programs reach beyond the current clientele base in housing programs. Another committee member questioned the allocation of funds, to which the applicant responded that the funds would support staff members to oversee

multiple services, mainly barrier mitigation assistance, and offer bus passes to individuals overcoming employment barriers to commute to their job for the first 30 days.

10 Green Our Planet – Compassionate Gardens Site Infrastructure & Energy Resilience

Target Population Low- and moderate-income residents of Northeast Las Vegas Students, educators, families, and community members. Staff, volunteers, and partners accessing the public facility

Estimated Number Served 2,500 individuals annually; thousands more through sustained programming and operations

Location 4333 N. Las Vegas Blvd., Las Vegas, NV 89115

Project Completion Timeline Months 1-3: Design and permitting; Months 4-6: Construction and installation

CDBG Request/Percentage of Total Project Budget \$250,000 /100%

A committee member inquired, assuming they secure the full grant of \$250,000 if that would result in an annual saving of \$19,000, and the applicant confirmed.

11 Affordable Housing Program, Inc. – Redevelopment of Authur Sartini Plaza

Target Population Seniors/Existing Residents

Location City of Las Vegas 89107

Project Completion Timeline April 2027 – November 2028

CDBG Funds Requested \$3,000,000/2.8%

A committee member asked about the roughly 50% figure for a one-bedroom unit. The applicant responded that all units will be project-based, meaning all residents are currently public housing residents, and they will continue to pay 30% of their income as rent until the organization transitions to the RAD Program. Participants will pay 30% of their income, with a minimum payment of zero if their income is zero, and all other expenses will be covered. During the discussion, a committee member questioned how the existing residents would be handled during the renovation process. The applicant explained that the large-scale redevelopment would be undertaken in phases, with approximately 4 out of 220 units to be worked on at any given time. Residents would either be relocated to other public housing facilities or receive vouchers to rent properties on the open market. Importantly, all residents currently residing in the building would be guaranteed the right to return after the project's completion. This phased construction approach guarantees that the building will always be occupied. According to the applicant, the project is expected to be completed within a year.

12 Clark County, NV – Southern Nevada’s Children’s Advocacy Center (SNCAC)

Target Population Children/Youth, Extremely Low, Low-Mod Income Persons, Persons Experiencing Homelessness, Person with Disabilities, Abused Children

Location 1401 Mineral Ave

Project Completion Timeline Nov 2026-June 2027

CDBG Request/% of Total Project Budget \$7.5m / 54%

A committee member requested details regarding the number of children the applicant has helped in their current location. The applicant reported that in 2025, they assisted 1,721 children within a confined space, including 1,213 forensic interviews and 306 medical examinations. Another committee member asked about the \$7.5 million request, specifically how they would move forward if the full amount is not secured. The applicant responded that they would need to determine if funding is available in the County budget, as no requirements have been made. The building purchase has been completed, and the requested funds are intended for tenant improvements. A committee member asked if the County had accessed funding through the interim finance committee or state agencies like Child Welfare and Department of Social Services. The Applicant replied that their services, including staffing, are supported by various funding sources. Specifically, the state supports the Child Protective Services component of the programing, and while American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds were requested for expanded staffing expenses, they were not received; however, federal appropriations were secured for the design of the medical clinic portion.

13 The Foundation Christian Center Community – The FCC Community Campus

Target Population Seniors, youth, families, persons w/disabilities

Estimated Number Served 200,000 or more over 10 years

Location Vacant Land, 4337 North Las Vegas Blvd, Las Vegas, NV 89115

Project Completion Timeline July 2026 – June 2027

CDBG Request/Percentage of Total Project Budget \$783,000/88%

A committee member had significant concerns about the allocation of the requested \$783,000, which covers the infrastructure and other project essentials, amounting to 88% of the current phase’s cost. The applicant further clarified that the project is being implemented in phases with all programing being finalized, and that the current request pertains exclusively to infrastructure needs such as lighting, security, cameras, and kitchen facilities for the entire complex. In response to question from a committee member about the request specifics, the applicant detailed the funding’s intended use. The committee member requested the breakdown of the funds. The applicant explained the projects phased nature and the involvement of partner organizations in Nevada which would also contribute financially to the project’s awareness, particularly for the first phase of resiliency hubs. When reminded of a previous \$3 million funding request from CDAC, the applicant stated that partnering with another organization would help meet the project’s

financial needs. Another committee member noted the nearness of the applicants' address to a fresh garden facility and asked if they would be participating with them. The applicant replied that the fresh garden facility would donate its fresh produce to the 800 households in the area once it starts producing.

14 Transitional Housing Project- Bridge Counseling Associates

Target Population LMI/homeless adult singles that will benefit from integrated behavioral health services.

Estimated Number Served 200 adults/year @ six month stays. *BONUS: Upon CDBG approval, 20 Treatment Shelter Beds with meals (male/Medicaid). 200 Adults/year @ 10-week programs.

Location 4221 McLeod Drive at East Flamingo

Project Completion Timeline Year 1 – \$5 Million (Q1 Permits, Utilities, and Planning Q2 Foundation, Framing and Rough Work, Q3/4 Walls, Plumbing, Electrical, Safety); Year 2 - \$3 Million (Q1/2+ Finalize Construction, Q3 CoO)

CDBG Request/Percentage of Total Project Budget \$8,000,000/71.4%

A committee member asked if the applicant has a contingency plan if funding is not approved; applicant said no. Another member asked about the prior CDBG funding timing out. Applicant said they were asked to start later than planned; costs had increased in the meantime, and project timed out; the committee member asked if this would be a concern for this project and if County could give assurances this would not happen again. Applicant stated a substantial amount of work had already been done. Staff shared that project readiness is an area of scoring; last award was rescinded due to project nonperformance. Applicant disagreed but said they were shovel ready and would offer 20 beds right away with supportive services in place. Clients would be supported to find own housing hopefully within six months. The committee member asked about delays that may be out of applicant's control. Staff clarified there was not a holdup of County processes, the issue was project readiness. Same standards would apply with any other project. Another applicant asked about the status; applicant indicated a contractor would be needed but a contract manager had been selected. A committee member asked about CCBHC; applicant defined Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic. Another committee member asked if applicant anticipated any other delays; applicant did not and reiterated the 20 beds available throughout construction; applicant also referenced increased sources of revenue they now have through other programs and projects.

15 TSI Collaborative Refuge – Transition Services for Independence

Target Population Adults with Disabilities and Surrounding Community

Estimated Number Served Increase clients served from 260 to 400 (across all sites), roughly 100 individuals with IDD directly served in this location

Location 6100 W. Cheyenne Ave, Las Vegas NV 89108

Project Completion Timeline July 2026 – December 2027

CDBG Request/Percentage of Total Project Budget \$2,877,000/100%

A committee member asked if the applicant had any Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding, to which the applicant responded that they do not hold any CDBG funds but that she had previously secured funding for Lutheran Social Services of Nevada and Family Promise of Las Vegas; this would be TSI's first request for CDBG funding. The applicant was asked if the funding request was for renovation; they explained the existing facility's condition and their plan to build a new 15,000 square foot facility behind the current location on W. Cheyenne. The existing building, owned by the Applicant after being donated years ago, is deemed unsafe. Concerns were raised regarding project costs, particularly ADA accommodations. The applicant justified the phased approach due to the project's \$2.8 million cost and confirmed seeking funding from multiple sources. A committee member asked if the organization would provide and charge adults for its services, and the applicant said no. The organization's services are financed through Desert Regional Center, whose funding comes from the State of Nevada. A significant 96% of the center's clients are Medicaid beneficiaries, allowing the state to reimburse these clients. The organization does not, however, receive capital funding from the state. A committee member remained uncertain about the requested funds and asked if people reside in the building and if it has walls. The applicant replied that the building is 15,000 square feet. The committee member asked if the project is a renovation. The Applicant explained that the building serves as a venue for activities and does not provide residence, and the requested funds would facilitate renovations to create a safe and accessible environment with ADA accommodations for clients. Another committee member inquired about the zoning status of the facility. The Applicant stated that they have been zoned for 15 years to provide services for people with developmental disabilities.

- V. Presentation on 2026-2028 CDBG Application Scoring Process and ZoomGrants Overview (Kent Golangco)

Chairperson Jeng acknowledged that Kent Golangco, Grant Coordinator, would be providing information about ZoomGrants and the scoring process. He also urged the committee to closely monitor this process and encouraged them to present any questions or concerns at this time. Kent Golangco gave a brief presentation about the process for CDAC scoring recommendations. The presentation included aspects for evaluation for CHO administration and CDAC. Kent displayed a scoring considerations, applicant summary, and project map chart and discussed the funding contingency plan.
